Credit vs. Noncredit Classes at Montgomery College

What is your next step? If you want to take a course at Montgomery College, you have two options: noncredit classes or credit classes.

Noncredit Classes	Credit Classes
Students learn new job skills or improve their existing skills. These classes <i>do not</i> lead to a degree or certification.	Students receive grades and earn credits toward a degree or certification.

What are the differences between credit classes and noncredit classes? See the chart below:

	Noncredit Classes	Credit Classes
Admission Requirements and Testing	Enrollment is open. You do not need a high school diploma. Also, you do not need to take a test.	You do not need a high school diploma. You must pass the Accuplacer tests for English and mathematics.
Cost	You pay tuition and fees, but noncredit classes usually cost less than credit classes. For class costs, see www.montgomerycollege.edu/wdce or call 240-567-5188	You pay tuition and fees. The cost depends on where you live. In Fall Semester 2018 to Summer Semester 2019, a Montgomery County resident pays \$197 per credit. Many classes are 3 credits. There are some extra fees. A 3 credit class costs \$517.80 with the fees.
Financial Aid	No loans are available. There is a scholarship program through Workforce Development & Continuing Education.	Scholarships and loans are available.
Time	Noncredit classes don't lead to a degree. You can take one class, or a series of classes, on your own schedule.	Full-time students take 2 years to complete an Associate's Degree. Part time students take longer.
Types of Classes	You take classes to learn new job skills, to get a better job, or for your personal development.	You take general education classes, as well as classes in your major area of study.
Grades	No.	Yes. If you get a D or an F in a class, you must take it again.
Employment Outlook	Generally speaking, you may be able to get or improve your job more quickly with noncredit classes. However, your position might be lower if you don't have a degree.*	Generally speaking, you may get a higher position with a degree. However, a degree takes time.*
